The meeting was opened with Salute to the Flag, led by Supervisor Todd Bradt.

George Cosselman made a motion to accept the meeting minutes from the regular meeting on March 8<sup>th</sup>, 2023. 2<sup>nd</sup> by Ivan Duesler. 5 ayes, carried.

# **Reports:**

Code Enforcement Officer:

- Devon Percival talked about a solar roof project on Route 10. They are awaiting feedback from an engineer on the 70 pound load calculations on roofs. State building requirements changed for solar panels. They can no longer be installed on a steel roof, it has to be on shingles because of the concern with heavy wet snow.
- Mr. Percival and Mr. Bradt met with DEC regarding flood plain permits. These permits may only apply to a couple properties in Ephratah that may be considered in a flood zone.
- Devon Percival submitted his annual report for Code Enforcement.
- There are properties on Old State Road that will be issued tickets to remedy trash complaints.
- There were commercial inspections done and two properties will be posted as condemned. There is a building in Rockwood that failed the fire safety inspection. Mr. Percival, as Assistant Fire Chief, gives him the authority to condemn buildings.

Planning Board:

- Devon Percival said a property owner on Route 10 near the Rockwood Dam wants to build an in-law suite and the engineer will be doing the drawings with a 90 foot setback.
- Bill Simpson sent in a report that is on file in the clerk's office. A property was separated at 286 County Hwy 119.
- The Planning Board is planning to host an Emergency Preparedness Meeting in the fall with more details to be forthcoming.

<u>Highway:</u>

- Highway Superintendent Alan Cretser reported that the crew did the MSHA Training. Some of the rules changed and the crew needs to print their names.
- Sexual Harassment training for the highway department will be pm Tuesday April 25<sup>th</sup> @ 9am. The Town officials will have training on May 10<sup>th</sup>, 2023.
- Black top bids will be going out for approximately 7000 feet on the Mud Road and 5000 feet on Bolster Hill. It would be for approximately 2100 ton. Mr. Cretser said the Chips money could be the same as in the past.
- The highway department plans to start sweeping with the road broom.
- Mr. Cretser would like to purchase a small dump truck and shared quotes with the Town Board.

# **Resolution 48**

Ivan Duesler made a motion to accept Resolution 48 to adopt the Adirondack Park Resolution number 2 of 2023 as follows:

# Adirondack Park Local Government Review Board

# Resolution No. 2 of 2023

**Resolution against passage of Conservation Subdivision Design Bill** A04608 **WHEREAS**, The Adirondack Park Agency Adopted a Large Subdivision Permit application that incorporated many of the action items in the Conservation Subdivision Design Bill, and

**WHEREAS**, implementation of the Adirondack Park Agency Large Subdivision Permit, is possibly more protective of the Environment than the Conservation Subdivision Design allows for, and

WHEREAS, Conservation Design laws are seldom mandatory, and are a tool to keep open space in urban areas, and

**WHEREAS**, the State of New York as of March 20, 2018 owned 2,505,802 or 44.6 percent of the Adirondack Park in fee, the State as of November 12 2018 also owns 785,434 acres of Conservation Easements, where development and subdivision rights have been extinguished, and

**WHEREAS**, this means there are more than 3.3 million acres of a 5.9-million-acre Adirondack Park that will never be developed or subdivided, and

**WHEREAS**, of the remaining 2.6 million acres of private land, existing development, roads, lakes, rivers, streams, steep slopes, wetlands and high elevations are not suitable for development, and

**WHEREAS**, the proposed legislation would amend the existing Adirondack Park Agency Act which has been in effect for 50 years, and

WHEREAS, before major Adirondack Park Agency permit application processes are changed, a public hearing process needs to be implemented so that property owners have an opportunity to understand and comment on how this proposed law will affect their property values, and

WHEREAS, this change would require private property owners to incur undue burden to hire external consultants to complete additional ecological assessments that will add significant time to proceed with proposed developments, and

**WHEREAS**, this proposed law could eliminate the potential for development on certain lands, which could be a "taking" without compensation, current law already protects and regulates these lands by the Adirondack Park Agency, and

WHEREAS, the proposed bill places additional burden on property owners that is not necessary to

protect environmental and ecological systems and is not beneficial to the well-being of the Adirondack Park

and its residents.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Adirondack Park Local Government Review Board does not approve of the proposed Bill, and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Adirondack Park Local Government Review Board does hereby call upon the local governments to stand together, individually and through our associations to insist that the Conservation Subdivision Design Bill (A04608) be withdrawn, and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that copies of this Resolution be forwarded to Governor Kathy Hochul, Senate Majority Stewart-Cousins, Senator Stec, Senator Griffo, Senator Walczyk, Assembly Speaker Heastie, Assemblyman Jones, Assemblyman Simpson, Assemblyman Smullen, Assemblyman Blankenbush Adirondack Intercounty, the Association of Adirondack Towns & Villages, and the Chairs of the Encon Committees Senator Harckham, Assemblywoman Glick.
